The Gospel of Matthew 11: 25-30 *Gentle and humble of heart*

A reflection on this Sunday's First Reading

Today we hear from the rarely read Prophet Zechariah, known (perhaps somewhat lamentably) as one of the "minor" Old Testament Prophets. Zechariah's prophetic activity takes place in the period after the exiles were allowed to return from Babylon to Jerusalem, in the reign of King Cyrus.

Cyrus the Persian had seized Jerusalem in 539 BC and subsequently permitted the Jews to return to their homeland in 538 BC. The second Prophet Isaiah had anticipated such a return (*"Comfort my people"*). But when they returned from captivity things did not go as smoothly as they had hoped.

Rebuilding the holy city and the temple took years; the people were depressed, they were the taunt of their neighbours.

The Samaritans, living to the north of Jerusalem, were a people created through old Israelite bloodlines mingled with people imported by the Assyrians after the 722BC exile. These people did worship Yahweh, the God of Israel, but their style of worship and piety was quite different from that of the returning Jews, and tensions arose: we see this in the time and ministry of Jesus also.

The most important and sacred work after the exile is the rebuilding of the temple by Zerubbabel. Zechariah and Haggai the prophets called for this rebuilding to take place, during the years 520-518 BC. The temple was dedicated in 515BC. Zerubbabel the governor of Judah, because of his completion of the new temple, was seen by the prophets as being a kind of *messiah* figure, but Zechariah saw beyond Zerubabbel's governorship, to the end of the Persian dominance, its collapse, and its replacement with the Kingdom/Reign of God.

Zechariah doesn't so much call the people to action but encourages them to wait expectantly for God to act. The signs of the new Kingdom will be wonderful! There will be a new King and he will come "humbly... on a donkey" and will banish the bow of war. Such is the importance of the contribution of even a "minor" prophet, that John the evangelist quotes him and sees Jesus perfectly fulfilling the prophecy as he, the True Messiah, rides into the Holy City on Palm Sunday Morning.

The Church chooses this piece from Zechariah to compliment the Gospel this Sunday. (*The first reading* on Sundays is always chosen to shed light on/prepare us for the Gospel text.) The humble king spoken of by Zechariah is seen in the flesh in Jesus of Nazareth, who, while having this unique relationship with God the Father, and blessing the Father in such personal langauge, is neverthless himself "gentle and humble in heart". We are invited to draw close to that heart, that Sacred Heart as we –each in our own way – keep this Sunday holy.

Intercessions:

Take a few moments to bring before the Lord your intentions and conclude with the *Our Father*.
