Seats for our Masses are now available to book up to and including Sunday 16 August 2020.

The number of people we are allowed to accomodate at any one liturgical gathering has been set by the Scottish government and we must adhere to that. So please don't arrive for **Sunday Mass** without booking a place as we don't want to have to turn anyone away. Please advise your friends to book a place also.

Finance Matters

I want to sincerely thank all of you who have in recent times made such a generous financial commitment to the upkeep of these parishes and churches.

Since the time of lockdown began, the total income to the **Cathedral** (comprising standing orders, one-off offertory contributions, bank transfers, cash, cheques and gift aid envelopes sent in to the parish and including £314 in the plate collection last Sunday) totalled £13,434.

In **Our Lady of Good Counsel,** since the time of lockdown began, the total income (comprising standing orders, one-off offertory contributions, bank transfers, cash, cheques and gift aid envelopes sent in to the parish and including £725 in the plate collection last Sunday) totalled £7527.

Gift aid envelopes

A Prayer to conclude

Some discover your Kingdom O God by surprise, like hidden treasure, buried in a field. To others your kingdom is the pearl of great price, the end of a long and hard search. The paths by which you lead us are many, the net that gathers us in is wide. Teach us not to judge others, so that we might attend first to our own commitment, and be trained by your Son for the Kingdom of heaven. This we ask through Christ our Lord, Amen.



What is it like?

The Kingdom of God is like a pearl, like a dragnet, like a treasure hidden in a field; it is like all these, and like much more, but it is not any of these things. The Kingdom is such an a amazing thing that it cannot be defined, or even directly described. All we can do is tell stories about it. And even then it seems, it must be a special kind of story— a parable. A parable is more than a story—it is a challenge to the way we think and live. It can turn reality upside down or sideways from the way we usually view it. It can give a new slant on a situation and can challenge us to deal with it differently. This Sunday's Gospel comes from a "day of parables" with Jesus teaching the people at great length. We are now in the 13th chapter of Matthew, reading it gradually each Sunday in this liturgical year. The Liturgical cycle is a three year process and the major focus in each of the three years is one of the synoptic Gospels — Matthew, Mark or Luke, in turn, with Saint John's unique Gospel being woven into each year especially during the Passover Season of the Lent-Triduum-Easter.



Like a pearl of great price

St Matthew's Gospel presents Jesus as a very powerful teacher, who frequently uses the medium of parable as a method of inviting his hearers to reflect on the things of God, and make connections between their daily round and the wonderful life into which God was gradually calling them.

What a power he demonstrated as he taught! It is Luke who tells us that he went to the synagogue in his hometown and took the scroll of Isaiah the prophet, opened it, read it, closed it, sat down.....and all eyes were fixed on him! What a demonstration of tremendous power. Matthew's Sermon on the Mount in chapters 5-7 is similar.

The people wondered how he could speak with such authority; they were astonished at his power.



Like a dragnet

At one point, talking of the mystery of the Kingdom of God he says "It is within you". It is like he's saying, don't be going looking here and there; don't think you can find it outside yourself. No. The Kingdom is within. And when you find it you will be indeed like the guy in the gospel who finds the precious gem....there's nothing you'll trade it for. Or the one who discovers treasure hidden in a field—a common practice, I've read, was to bury your treasure in order to hide it from thieves, yet this treasure was found.....and the man goes and sells everything he own and buys the field. Is the that the way it is for those who find the treasure of the Kingdom? A single minded reponse.

Many of us search, don't we, we search and search for our truest, deepest identity: often we measure ourselves in terms of what we are worth financially, or how beautiful we are, or how we've kept our youth (or not), or by what we've achieved. All valid, but when we finally find ourselves created by God, rooted in Christ, loved eternally, then there is nothing, surely nothing we would trade that in for!



Like treasure hidden in a field
