

Salvation comes to the house of the Tax Collector!



Believe it or not, the meal of Jesus at the home of Zacchaeus is the seventh meal story in Luke's Gospel - his text is indeed the *Gospel of Meals*, and this is one of the last which Luke records before the Last Supper. The story begins with Zacchaeus seeking to see Jesus and it ends with Jesus saying that the Son of Man comes to *seek out and save what was lost*. The seeker, Zacchaeus, doesn't know that he is in fact being sought out himself!

At a meal in Jesus' culture, the one honoured is the **host**, when a guest comes to table. Yet Jesus, on his way to Jerusalem for the festival, is now about to "defile" himself, by sitting at the table of a tax collector, an outcast, a reject. Jesus shatters the rules, breaks the boundaries and let's them think what they like.

He says - *Today salvation has come to this house*. Salvation comes, because this wretched tax collector accepts Jesus the Prophet with graciousness and hospitality. And also, he will give half his possessions to the poor. Now, for a chief tax collector that wouldn't be a bad sum. Jesus accepts this despised man, tiny in stature and, until now, grudging in spirit; but now he is transformed. Jesus accepts him as a child of Abraham, and an heir of the kingdom.

Perhaps Luke intends us to look at Zacchaeus alongside the rich young man who asked Jesus what he had to do to be saved. Both men are powerful and wealthy. The first had kept all the commandments, had been like the elder brother in the prodigal son scenario, and not unlike the Pharisee of last Sunday. The rich man was considered, and considered himself, righteous, and yet he could not do the one remaining thing that was asked - that of giving his possessions to the poor, couldn't hand himself over to the heart of Jesus, even though he'd handed himself over to the keeping of the Law and the saying of the Prayers. On the other hand, Zacchaeus, considered to be the sinner, eagerly accepts the Prophet with joy, and enthusiastically accepts Jesus into his home.

And again. of course. the "leaders" grumble - they cannot rejoice in another's conversion, in another's blessing: *Who does he think he is?* And also, *Does he think he is the Messiah, or what?* And further: *Look, he's gone to eat at a sinner's house*. And they get ready to arrest him. *The plot thickens indeed...*
