



This little graphic will remind many of you of one of the most loved of contemporary hymns, and we will sing it at some of the Masses over this weekend. The hymn itself is actually a setting

of Psalm 91 by the American priest Father Michael Joncas and is a lovely marriage of words and music. The late Michael McBride took the melody of *On eagles' wings* and with characteristic talent he arranged it for the Cathedral choir with organ in three part harmony, in such a way that he actually improved on the original score! The Psalm text itself echoes a verse from the Book of Exodus: this is the book of the liberation of God's people, a story of freedom, of promise, of their new homeland and new beginnings, brought about after much struggle and pilgrimage.

It strikes me that our whole liturgical experience should be one of we ourselves being *lifted up on eagles' wings*, towards the Lord, and into the mystery of his presence. *On Eagles' wings* is often chosen to be sung at Funeral Masses, where its words take on an even more poignant meaning. In this month we carry our beloved dead in our hearts, but we don't just recall them wistfully. We pray for them and we express, in the liturgy especially, our faith that they will come to be with the Lord in heaven.

The Catholic understanding of the Communion of Saints is like *two-way traffic* between ourselves and the dead - the saints pray for us and we pray for the dead. The Church urges her members never to try and interfere with the dead by way of séances, magic etc. but rather to remember them and thank God for their lives. But we also do something more for them when we reach out in prayer across the change death brings. Those who have died cannot intercede for themselves, so the whole church, valuing the dignity of their human lives, holds them deep in its memory and constantly implores God to remember them in heaven - to bring them through the process of purification we call purgatory. To *remember* in this context is more than just to *call to mind*, it is to *gather them up*.

Everything that lives on earth must die: that is certain. We learn it as children with goldfish and budgies; everything that inhabits earth has a limited life span, even if we would at times wish to resist and deny that truth; of course, in our human nature we fight for life; but in our spiritual selves we know deeply that we are made for something more than just what we experience in the here and now, we sense that we have another future.

About Jesus' own resurrection, the Gospel affirms two things: the empty tomb, and the fact that people, who had loved him and followed him, saw him alive again after his burial. No one saw him leave the tomb; the Gospels don't explain the resurrection, rather, the resurrection explains the Gospels, written as they are from the standpoint of Easter faith. These truths become the Church's biggest conviction: that Jesus' resurrection is ours also; it is bodily, it is full. We look forward *in joyful hope!*
