This Sunday we will hear the **Beatitudes** — some of the strongest statements we hear from Jesus in the gospels. We heard them around twelve weeks ago when we gathered to celebrate All Saints' Day. But imagine hearing them for the first time, more than 2000 years ago! The rule of divine retribution was deeply ingrained in these people of the first century. These statements starkly reveal that the people chosen as exemplars of nearness to God are actually all marginal, dependent people.

Further, Jesus reveals that the key feature of *blessedness* is that it involves living a deliberately chosen and cultivated sort of life which is not involved in the power and violence of the world, and which, because of this, actually makes the ones living it immensely vulnerable to being turned into victims. This is a theme taken up by Jesus throughout this *Sermon on the Mount*. And Matthew revisits the same theme in the judgement scene towards the end of his narrative, like a mirror image. In that famous passage, judgement is defined not in terms of belonging to this or that group, or believing this or that dogma. The judgement is presented in terms of the human relationships towards victims, those who hunger, thirst, are naked, sick, or imprisoned. Those who have truly understood, whether or not they know anything about Jesus, are those who have seen their way out of the self-deception of the world which is blind to its victims, and have reached out to help them. The intelligence of the victim! And of course, as we share the Mass together, we rediscover that it is a victim, a crucified and risen Victim who is also the judge of the world, and that the world is judged in the light of its relationship to this crucified and risen Victim.

As we journey into the Beatitudes this Sunday we long that the day will come when the church, the parish, shines fully with the effects of living those Beatitudes: when we will together truly be peace makers, hunger for justice and actively show God's mercy. But meanwhile we thank God for where we are and what we have: we thank God for the sensitivity we have in our parish for the stranger, the housebound, the sick, the bereaved, the lonely, the children, the poor.

Thank the Lord today in the Liturgy for what he enables you already to offer. Implore him to shine his light on your pathway, to make real the hymns we sing, not least about *seeking his kingdom first*, and *walking in the light*. Further implore him about the *graces we resist* and the *chances we have missed*, that in answer he will help our generosity our resolve to grow so that his Beatitudes really are alive in our lives.
