I know that a number of you read the weekly journal, *The Tablet*. An article appeared in last week's edition entitled *Empty pews mean Empty pockets* and the Church financial procedures reported in it might

be misleading for readers in Scotland.

Whatever the situation in England & Wales regarding parish income, the financial regulations in Scottish Dioceses for parishes and priests in Scotland mandate that **all** monies from offertory collectons, standing orders, and general donations are paid directly into the bank and are for the upkeep and mission of the parish along with a levy (15% in Dunkeld) for diocesan costs. Most importantly, there is no question of priests in Scotland retaining the Easter and Christmas offerings for personal use. This would be highly irregular and indeed has never been the case in Scotland.

In addition to "board and lodgings", and any Mass offerings received from individual donors, each priest in Scotland receives an annual stipend from the parish, which is less than a third of the £9500 noted in the *Tablet* article.

It is because of your generosity that our parishes and dioceses are able to function and for that I know each priest stands grateful.

Booking a place for Mass - Important Update

We're now very close to entering the second month of reduced numbers at Mass, and, for the Vigil and Sunday Masses, having to book a place in order to be able to attend.

It's been a challenging time for us all and these arrangements look like continuing for some time yet. I'd like to thank you for your patience in coming to terms with the booking system in place – it's been a significant adjustment for everyone involved but I feel we are all now getting used to it. It is perhaps therefore an opportune time to refine some of the previously issued advice on booking for Mass:

- Bookings are no longer required for weekday and Saturday morning Mass at the Cathedral. Seats will be allocated to worshippers on arrival and you will be taken to this seat by one of our Stewards;
- Currently, bookings can be made for the Vigil and Sunday Masses up to and including Sunday 13 September;
- Online bookings on the Eventbrite website cease 24 hours before the start time of the Mass. This is to ensure that our organisers have sufficient time to meet seating requirements within the guidance on social distancing, households, 'bubbles' etc;
- The dedicated phone number (07561 699557) is primarily available for those parishioners who have no access to the internet. If you're making a booking on the dedicated phone number, then wherever possible, it would be appreciated if you didn't leave it until the day of the Mass to call. This is to avoid disappointment, as it may not always be possible for the organisers to respond in good time as they may be allocating or re-allocating seats and making up attendance sheets;
- With the start of the new school year upon us, we will be responding to messages and texts left on the booking line number in the evenings;
- All enquiries about seat bookings, cancellations, queries and the like **should not be sent directly to me** as I may not be able to answer them. Instead, if you booked via Eventbrite, you can click **'Contact the Organiser'** on your confirmation email. After seeing a list of questions, scroll down and select 'contact the organiser' again and you'll be able to email us with the details of your query. We'll answer it just as soon as we can. If you booked via the dedicated phone number (07561 699557), then please text or call and leave a message and we will get back to you;
- If you're not able to attend a Mass you've booked for, or if the numbers you've booked for have

decreased, please let us know by contacting us via Eventbrite or on the dedicated booking number. We've had to turn people away at the church door on a number of occasions over the last month only to find that they could have joined us at Mass after all, which is very sad indeed;

Our Sunday Masses are very busy, with the 11:00
 Mass at the Cathedral fully booked at least two weeks ahead. Our Vigil Mass on Saturday at 16:00 is generally quieter with spare seats available each week.

Finally, it would be extremely helpful if we had perhaps two additional volunteer Stewards at the Cathedral – other than for the 1100 Sunday Mass, as we can at times struggle to cover the Steward duties. If you can help, please let me know.

The Ark of the Covenant

This will surely be one of the more difficult Sundays to celebrate the Eucharist without singing, because it is one of the great feasts of the Blessed Mother and in our Catholic life we love to raise our voices in song to praise the beauty of Mary and her role in the plan of God's salvation, just as she lifted her voice to praise God in her *Magnificat* at the home of Elizabeth, which we hear in the Gospel of the *Visitation* today. Like many of you I guess, the first hymn I ever learned was *I'll sing a hymn to Mary*.



One of our contemporary hymns speaks of her as the *Mother of Jesus and mother of lowliness*, and traces her place in salvation history and finally praises her as *Mary, our Lady of light, the Father's delight* and sings of her role as heavenly intercessor – *pray for us sinners to Jesus your Son*.

Along with these and many other hymns, the **Litany of Our Lady** has long been part of our devotional life, usually prayed after the recitation of the Rosary. It cries out for Mary's intercession, addressing her in myriad titles of praise. Among these is the invocation *Ark of the Covenant*. On this Solemnity of her Assumption we can say that the *Ark of the Covenant* becomes the *Gate of Heaven*, and its *Morning Star*, to continue the language of the Litany.

At the time of the Book of Revelation – from which the mighty text of the First Reading on this feastday is taken, the original *Ark* had been lost for over 500 years. The prophet Jeremiah had hidden the Ark to prevent its capture and desecration by the Babylonians, and declared, "The place is to remain unknown until God gathers His people together again and shows them His mercy" (see the 2nd Book of Macabees 2:7).

In his vision in the Apocalypse, John saw the ark and then he saw Mary. Mary carried in her womb our Lord, who is the Word of God, the true High Priest and the Bread of Life. So we can say that Mary is the new Ark of the New Covenant, which our Lord will make in his own blood.

This "woman clothed with the sun" surely refers to our Blessed Mother, the "birth pangs" being that pain she shared with her son at the foot of the cross, bringing old Simeon's prophecy - "a sword will pierce your own soul too" – to fulfilment. Way back in her Magnificat, she had sung of the promises made to Abraham being brought to completion. No wonder that in our Catholic life we honour and celebrate regularly her unique role in the fulfilment of those promises - from her first "Yes" to the angel Gabriel, "I am the handmaid of the Lord, let it be done unto me according to your word", through her life as mother and disciple, her martyrdom at the foot of the cross, the awaiting of the Holy Spirit in the Upper Room with the apostles, to her crowning as Queen of angels, patriarchs, prophets, (as the Litany says) in heaven.

Often Mary is protrayed with her foot crushing the head of the serpent. The early church fathers called her the "New" Eve, her complete obedience of faith contrasting with disobedience of the "old" Eve of Genesis.

A long forgotten hymn from the old St Andrew Hymnal – which would have been so appropriate for this feastday - puts it like this:

Queen of the world, the stars around her spread, upon the summit of the world she stands. Her heel is set upon he serpent's head and grace falls shining from her outstretched hands.
