Hospital Chaplaincy and Visitation



The Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus falls this coming Friday 16 June.



I find the Sacred Heart of Jesus a potent symbol, its "pierced-ness" not only the "fountain of Sacramental life for the Church" as the Preface of the Feast says, but also a reminder of the "devouring" of the loving heart of God by his people for all their needs, especially the need to give and receive authentic love.

No wonder this feast is placed very close to that of the Body and Blood of the Lord. For as we "devour" the Eucharistic food, we surely desire not only to be nourished to a spiritual fulness for ourselves, but so that in turn we are able to offer the love which is given to us given in that ultimate "meal of love" to the world in which we live, our own wounded lives and hearts notwithstanding.

Keeping the feast of the Sacred Heart surely propels us outwards to be people and priests beyond the sacristy. beyond the altar table, beyond our own devotions, to be ministers of the hospitality of divine mercy and of a gospel justice which reveals and celebrates the divine Heart.

The Gospel passage stipulated for this feastday is from Saint Matthew, the passage where Jesus declares himself to be "gentle and humble of heart". Such an appropriate text, yet the Gospel choice could have been any number of other passages too. I think of Jesus "on the last and greatest day of the festival" in John, inviting all to come and drink from the fountain of his living water; or his piercing by the soldier's lance as he hung on the cross and out flowed blood and water; or any one of the great parables of mercy which reveal the divine Heart – think of the love of the father in the prodigal son story in Luke, the father whose own heart had been pierced but who never stopped loving the son and longed for his return; or the generosity of the God proclaimed in the parable of the workers in the vineyard in Matthew: "Why be envious because I am generous?".....oh, the possibilities seem endless!
