

The Mountain and the Valley

Usually on this Sunday of Transfiguration of Jesus I would write a column for the newsletter reflecting on the significance of this event as we journey towards Easter. However, I was forwarded the text of an address which Pope Francis gave recently to participants at a Conference promoted by the Vatican Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life, and I'd like to share something of it with you. I was immediately struck by how the Holy Father's words echoed three significant experiences in my own life, namely, my exposure to the teachings the Second Vatican Council, secondly, the vision underpinning the academic and pastoral formation I experienced in the seminary, and the understanding and vision of the Church I studied and experienced while doing a distance learning degree from Loyola University, New Orleans, two decades ago.




The text echoes the Holy Father's synodal attitude to the Church. He speaks of the witness of the apostolate of laypeople in daily life, and draws attention to the shared responsibility of pastors and the lay faithful. I can't help but feel I've lost something in recent years of the practice of this shared vision and responsibility, which happens to many priests as we are overtaken by concerns of maintenance (and not just of the plant!) and administration in the Church. Of course, these both are necessary—but at times they are at the expense of having time/energy to discern and articulate a shared vision. I am hopeful that those who come together this coming Saturday for our Lenten Day on *Thirsting for light and life* will go away with a renewed sense of being the Church, gathered round the scriptures as a source of life and grace. We surely need a renewed enthusiasm: we witness in the midst of what we might call a *secular reality* all around us, but in that we are surely no different from the early Christian communities which had to struggle in the face of persecution. The Pope urges an end to the separation often experienced between clergy and laity (indeed, he says, the word "laity" is never used in the New Testament); the texts there prefer "believers", "disciples", "brethren", "saints". "Sharing in mission", the Pope says, "builds a unity of purpose, manifests the complementarity of the differing charisms, and this awakens in all the desire to move forward together"; (that journeying, synodal theme again).

He speaks of the "correct" vision or "model" of the Church as the People of God. This is, of course, a biblical theme, present from the Book of Exodus onwards, but it was taken up afresh in the writings of the Second Vatican Council. The Holy Father speaks of pastors needing to be trained from their time in the seminary to work collaboratively with laypeople, "so that communion, as a lived experience, will be reflected in their activity as something natural, not extraordinary and occasional". It made me recall the pastoral formation, experience and reflection which were an integral part of my own seminary experience. When we were in Drygrange, near Melrose, all the students regularly took part in pastoral experiences in the local parishes in the Borders, learning how to catechise, care, celebrate and how to "team" with others, and to avoid a clericalist mentality of feeling we were somehow "above" those among whom we were being formed. I had the good fortune when the seminary moved to a new site in Edinburgh to be attached to two parishes over three years where priests and people showed me "how" to be priest through their example and guidance. This in turn informed my academic formation, which, and while I am in no way a real "academic" myself, this experience enriched and increased the fruits of the learning in the classroom. Finally, a pastoral year in a Dundee parish as a deacon proved to be a huge learning curve for me, before priestly ordination.

For all of us, priests and people, engaging with the journey of faith is surely an invitation from the Lord to grow more deeply in the things of the Spirit and to make present the Kingdom of God in the world, through the witness we give. And Pope Francis makes much of the notion of "witness" in his recent address. "A shared witness creates a people united in mission", he says. "This is the insight we must cherish", as the Second Vatican Council articulated in its Constitution on the Church, called *Lumen Gentium*: "the Church is the faithful, Holy People of God". The Holy Father develops this further, saying "The Church is neither populist nor elitist...we cannot learn this theoretically but through lived experience".

The Holy Father is clear: "Now is the time for pastors and laypersons to move forward together, in every sphere of the Church's life and in every part of the world! The lay faithful are not 'guests' in the Church; it is their home and they are called to care for it as such. Together with their pastors, laypersons must bring Christian witness to secular life: to the worlds of work, culture, politics, art and social communications".

On the Sunday of the Transfiguration, I am always struck how in the Gospel Peter expresses a desire to *remain on the mountaintop*, to bask in that glorious light, to remain in the idyll; but the Lord won't have that. They must come down the mountain; they must come out of the ecstasy, they must face the reality of life *down in the valley* and "get on with the work", so to speak. Ministry and Mission is that to which they are called. So it must be the same for us: ministry and mission, amidst the ordinariness, the messiness, and even the *ennui* of daily life.

This Sunday at the 11.15am Mass in St Mary's, Forebank we especially welcome the boys and girls who will soon receive the Sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation, along with members of their families.

This Sunday marks the beginning of their formal preparation for these Sacraments and they will write their names in the Book of Enrolment as a symbolic gesture of their desire to participate in the preparation for these great days in their lives. This Second Sunday of Lent is also the celebration of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mountain, where Peter, James and John, his close apostles, witness his human body being glorified in divine light, and they hear him being declared to them as the "Beloved Son" of the Father: *Listen to him!* the voice from heaven says. And that is what we seek to do throughout these days of renewal, to listen to **him**, so that our arrival at the Easter Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday of the Vigil, through to Easter Day itself is a full celebration of our belonging in the One who is the Redeemer. As we sing at the Easter Vigil — *What good would life have been to us, had Christ not come as our Redeemer?*
